



The major change Pilgrim is in the midst of is a Pastor who retired, an Interim Pastor who retired, a Presbyterian Bridge Pastor who was hired, and awaiting the arrival of a new Installed Pastor. That is a lot of change. Whether you see it as good or bad, any change causes stress and grief. But keep the faith, we are in this together, and God who has led Pilgrim in the past will continue to be faithful in the future.

There are also smaller changes that you will observe throughout the summer:

We have put a temporary hold on broadcasting our worship services while we set up a new system, which will be ready by September.

With Carolyn's retirement, Lorelei Holland will be putting the music together for the Contemporary Celtic worship service the first Sunday of the month.

We have already begun Sharing the Peace with a handshake, believing it is now safe to do so again.

As I said, I believe change is good. It helps us to look at ourselves and our church in new ways. At the same time, if some change does not sit well with you, please let me know and we can reconsider that change. Our goal, with most of the changes, is to re-establish that sense of community, that feeling that we are a family of faith, that was lost during the COVID 19 pandemic. To that end, we will try different things to help bring us closer together again as the Pilgrim community.



# Reading is good for your health!

How often do you take the time to sit down and read a good book, magazine, or newspaper? What if I told you reading can improve your health in many ways? The Journal of Social Science and Medicine has actually claimed that reading can increase your lifespan! Do I have your attention?

Let's dig into this claim a little bit by spotlighting five ways reading can improve your overall health.

First, reading can reduce stress. According to a 2009 study conducted by the University of Sussex in the United Kingdom, reading can reduce your stress by up to 68%, even more than listening to music or going for a walk. In as little as six minutes your heart rate slows down and muscle tension begins to relax. It does not matter what you are reading, you can momentarily escape your worries or stresses. The printed page stimulates your creativity and essentially alters your state of consciousness.

Second, reading can slow cognitive decline. As we age, our brains can begin to decline and slow down. Cognitive tasks we once found easy can become more challenging. Studies have shown that reading can improve brain health and slow down this cognitive decline even staving off dementia by keeping the brain active through reading or other mentally challenging activities.

Third, reading can improve sleep. It is so easy to reach for our smart phones as we lie down to go to bed. We know this isn't the best way to calm our brains down and prepare for a good night of sleep. But reading a book can offer that smooth transition between wakefulness and drowsiness.

Fourth, reading can enhance social skills. Books open our world to other points of view and experiences without leaving home, they increase awareness to a global world, and build empathy and understanding to other points of view and life experiences that differ from ours.

Fifth, reading may boost your intelligence! "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go," American author and illustrator Dr. Seuss once wrote, and it seems he was right. Reading increases vocabulary, critical thinking and has been linked with greater intelligence.

Reading improves your wellness in so many ways and it is free! In Superior we have a wonderful public library that I encourage you to visit, if you haven't. Get a library card, sign up for Libby, which is an App that allows you to download books to your Kindle, Ipad, etc. They also have Hoopla which is a vast online site that offers audiobooks, ebooks, magazine, movies, The Great Courses and so much more. The library staff are wonderful. There are adult book clubs, children's book clubs, free movies and so much more!

Reading, improves your health! Get to it! Summer is a great time to dive into a book and relish in the fact that you are working on your health!
