Please call the office 715 392 4731 or email <u>celonen@yahoo.com</u> and let us know if you are coming so we can have materials ready. Otherwise, just show up!





Saints and Siblings in Christ,

Last month Katie and I celebrated our five-year wedding anniversary with a trip out east, which included a stop in one of my bucket-list towns: Salem, Massachusetts. We, of course, took a tour of the town, and while I enjoyed the history,



getting to see the sites of filming for some of my favorite movies, and learning about the memorial for the 1692 witch trials, I found myself struck most by the closing words our tour guide shared with us. She said that a big part of the legacy of the witch trials that Salem and the surrounding communities participated in, is a commitment now to be a place of welcome. A place where you could be yourself—your whole self—without fear.

Now, we know that none of the 25 people who were killed or 150 people imprisoned in the fanatical frenzy of those 15 months in Salem were witches. But they were, in one way or another, "others" in their communities. They were people who were different. They were people who, for whatever reason, were singled out and ostracized. They were people who were seen to be easy pickings as victims of a society divided by fear.


There are so many events and periods of history that we learn about and think, "well that could never happen again! Our society is so much better now." And yet...I will never forget the rampant hatred spewed towards Muslims following 9/11 – including the first death following the attack, when Balbir Singh Sodhi, a Sikh-American man, was murdered on September 15, 2001 during a frenzy of attacks on anyone who didn't look like, well, us. Or the horrific rise of racist attacks against Asian Americans we saw during and since the COVID-19 pandemic. And it seems like every election cycle brings with it a slate of new 'enemies' that political rivals trot out to sow fear and division among us. Friends, I do not think we have come nearly as far as we would like to believe.

Which is exactly why walking the walk of faith is so important in our lives as Christians here and now. We talk a lot about being a place where all are welcome here at Pilgrim. I think – I hope – we really mean that when we say it. People of God, we have the incredible opportunity (and faithful responsibility) to share the good news of Jesus Christ with all people. It matters how we treat the people around us as we go about our days. It matters how we welcome people into this place of grace. It matters how we speak, how we act, how we live.

Over the next few months we're going to be launching into a whole lot of programming – new and old. Each time we gather we will have the opportunity to engage with our neighbors – known and unknown – in new ways. How we greet, treat, and interact with folks makes a difference. Providing a space that truly is welcome to all people doesn't just happen – it takes work. As God people called to this time and place, I'm excited that we get to do that work together.

And if you see a guy wandering around Super One wearing his new, red wizard hat this month, take it as a reminder that we're all a little different – and God loves us that way.


Pilgrim Community School – Canning Apple Pie Filling October 12th @9:00


United Campus Ministry

Stewardship - Walking the Talk



A nice 23 year run and still going strong. Along with this position Curt was the church Office Manager from 2007 to 2022. He serves as the Cantor, leading the liturgy when called upon. Curt selects and arranges all our choral music. He also provides solo performances when the choir is off. A natural baritone he fills the church with his wonderful voice.



Curt holds a Music Doctorate Degree from the University of Colorado, Boulder. He did his undergraduate and Masters Degree work at Bemidji State University in Minnesota. He has worked as a music teacher in southern Minnesota and later as a Music Professor at the John Duss Conservatory in Duluth.

Curt and his wife Brenda live in Proctor Minnesota where he grew up. They have two children, Eric and Evan. Both are computer science professionals working in central and southern Minnesota. Curt's dad was the Choir Director at his home church in Proctor and Duluth. His brothers and mom all sang in the choir as did he. His uncle was a professional singer with the Satisfiers – the musical group behind Perry Como's radio show in the 1940's. Curt is not exaggerating when he says "music is in my blood." Always interested in sports, an athlete in his own right, Curt has recently been exploring genealogy tracing his roots back to Ireland, Scandinavia and Medieval England. A fun hobby

This is Curt's paraphrased favorite quote from Martin Luther...."next to the word of God, music has the highest place". He fondly remembers his first rehearsal with the Pilgrim Choir. "I was received with open arms. Just a warm, cordial welcoming congregation. What I like best about this church are the people. I love music. I am very close to the faith. Music is my way of expressing it." Asked to describe himself, he replies "what you see is what you get." His mantra for us is to "just sing". We have been blessed with 23 years of faithful, creative and wonderful service bringing the joy of music to our worship.
